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## BARTHÉLÉMY TOGUO *Bilongue* (2020)

Galerie Lelong & Co., New York and Paris, is pleased to announce an installation by Barthélémy Toguo for Art Basel - Unlimited, comprising 45 zingana wood bas-reliefs from the artist's Bilongue series.

Bilongue is a neighborhood in the suburbs of Douala, Cameroon. Toguo stayed there in 2015 while preparing his work for the 56th Venice Biennale, curated by Okwui Enwezor. He encountered a vibrant population of people from different backgrounds, "survivors" as he described them, who struggled to earn a daily living and defend their meagre possessions from gangs. To survive and overcome, the residents of Bilongue, a sprawling shanty town,

developed strong bonds of solidarity. In their honor, Toguo created a Hall of Fame, a portrait gallery that commemorates their lives and struggles. Instead of using photography or painting, Toguo created a series of zingana wood *bas-reliefs* that pay homage to the African custom of creating wooden sculptures to commemorate kings and warriors. These 45 panels represent a courageous and determined group of men and women that, in Toguo's mind, are the true heroes of Cameroon.

Barthélémy Toguo has an ongoing solo exhibition *Urban Requiem* at the Savannah College of Art Design Museum of Art, Savannah, Georgia (through July 21, 2022) and his next solo exhibition will open at the Picasso Museum, Barcelona, Spain in fall 2022. The artist currently has works on view in *rīvus* - The 23rd Sydney Biennale, Australia; Forger / *Out of the fire, Dak'Art*, the Dakar Biennale 2022, Sénégal; and *WITNESS: Afro Perspectives from the Jorge M. Pérez Collection*, El Espacio 23, Miami, Florida.

## About the Artist

Working across painting, drawing, sculpture, photography, performance, and installation, Barthélémy Toguo addresses enduring and immediately relevant issues of borders, exile, and displacement. At the core of his practice is the notion of belonging, which stems from his dual French/Cameroonian nationality. Through poetic, hopeful, and often figural gestures connecting nature with the human body, Toguo foregrounds concerns with both ecological and societal implications. Recently, his works have been informed by movements and humanitarian tragedy including #BlackLivesMatter and the refugee crisis. He states, "What guides me is a constantly evolving aesthetic but also a sense of ethics, which makes a difference, and structures my entire approach."

In 2008, he founded Bandjoun Station in his native Cameroon to foster contemporary art and culture within the local community. The community center includes an exhibition space, a library, an artist residency, and an organic farm.

Toguo has participated in numerous international biennials, including the Sydney Biennale (2011, 2022); Kochi-Muziris Biennale, India (2018); Echigo-Tsumari Art Triennale (2018); 56th Venice Biennale (2015); Havana Biennial (2012); 11th Biennale de Lyon (2011); and Dakar Biennale (2000, 2010, 2016, 2018). In 2016, Toguo was shortlisted for the Prix Marcel Duchamp and he presented the installation Vaincre le virus! at the Centre Pompidou, Paris. Solo museum exhibitions have been held at the Savannah College of Art and Design Museum of Art, Georgia; Centre d'art La Malmaison, Cannes, France; Musée du Quai Branly, Paris, France; Parrish Art Museum, Water Mill, New York; and Palais de Tokyo, Paris, France. His works are included in public collections worldwide, including the Tate Modern, England; Centre Pompidou, France; Musée d'art contemporain de Lyon, France; Studio Museum Harlem, New York; and MoMA, New York. In 2011, Toguo was made a Knight of the Order of Arts and Literature in France.

Toguo was born in M'Balmayo, Cameroon, in 1967. He currently lives and works between Paris, France and Bandjoun, Cameroon.
